#### **Covid changes**

Changes to Covid restrictions although very welcome, have meant we have to meet new regulations and requirements, we are busily working of our BBQ procedures for Bunnings, Benton's Sq and Mt Martha Village, and at this stage. Bill Cummings still needs 8 people to help with Bunning and a further 8 for Benton's Square. Please contact him if you can help.

We are unsure of exactly when we will be able to resume face to face meetings, but we are certain that to attend any hotel, pubs and clubs you will need to be fully vaccinated. We are working of a system to manage this information. But it certainly is great to be able to get out and about.

#### Rotary Club meeting last week

Last week we welcomed Tim Costello to our Zoom meeting which was a great success and certainly very interesting and eye opening. We were joined by Rotary members from Mount Eliza, Tyabb/Somerville, and Rosebud/Rye Rotary clubs as well several interested people who responded to our Facebook invitation.

Tim spoke about 'Pokies on the Peninsula' and provided us with some very worrying facts and figures. The Mornington Peninsula has the eighth highest expenditure on gambling in the State spending \$236 per day Brimbank is the highest. Australia has 20% of the world's Pokie machines and spends \$24 billion on pokies each year. There are 830 pokie machines on the Mornington Peninsula in 17 venues and there is a correlation between highest losses and low social economic groups.

We heard that 75% of poker machines run from 9:00 AM to 5:00 AM in pubs, clubs and hotels on 24thus catching many opportunist gamblers. The State government receives 12% of its revenue from gambling and is thus very reliant on maintaining these machines in pubs and clubs and has extended their licences to 2046.

After Tim had provided us with these disturbing facts and figures he told us about his organisation the Alliance against Gambling, he stated that aims of the organisation were that;

- free to air gambling ads are banned
- donations from gambling organisations to politicians are stopped
- close poker machine venues by midnight
- slow the machines down and to have all bids made with \$1 bids and to 'lock in your losses' which enables the machines to lock you out.

Both Mornington Peninsular and Frankston Councils have joined his organisation.

Tim briefly mentioned Sports Bets although mainly attracting younger men, the daytime ads were impacting on children, while women were mainly attracted to the poker machines. There are over 3 million Australians affected by gambling in Australia each year.

### **Club Christmas Party**

We have booked the Mornington Golf Club for our Christmas function on 9 December this is on a Thursday as it was the only evening available in December. We have booked for around 60 people. we have been advised that anyone attending will have to be fully vaccinated. We will keep everyone informed as we get more information.
















# **David Crane's Rotary Journey**

David joined Rotary when he was inducted into the Rotary Club of Morwell on 8<sup>th</sup> August 1974. He enjoyed the fellowship and programs and projects and developed a strong commitment to the Rotary ideals. When Rotary had a need for another club in the region, David became a Charter Member of the Rotary Club of Hazelwood in 1978. Serving on various committees gave him the opportunity to learn more of what Rotary is all about with time on Vocational, Club Service and Program Director.

When he became President of the Rotary Club of Hazelwood in 1980-81, he was well prepared. In 1988 he was awarded his first Paul Harris Fellowship, presented by the highly regarded Mount Martha Rotarian DG Arthur Care. Rotary had become an integral part of his life by 1994 as there were so many ways to benefit the local communities and so, after 20 years in Rotary he took on a new challenge and was District Chair of NYSF for three years. Rotary and its benefits to the community culminated in David becoming District Governor for D9820 (1998/99) and he attended the Rotary International Convention in Singapore. A wonderful experience seeing the same commitment of fellow Rotarians from all over the world.

David's other achievements in Rotary include being a "Parliamentarian "at Resolutions Session of RI Institute in Townsville (Zones 7(a) and 8(a) in 2000; and in 2001/03 a Member of the District Constitution, Resolutions and By-Laws Committee and Chairman of Resolutions Session of RI Institute in Melbourne (Zones 7(a) and 8(a). David and Margaret relocated and settled in McCrae and in 2001, David transferred his membership to Mount Martha Rotary.

Between 1994 and 2003 he was involved with "Siemens Science Experience" for Youth, and "National Engineering Summer School". As the 2001 District 9820 Delegate to RI Council on Legislation in Chicago he attended the RI Convention in San Antonio, Texas in 2001 and was a Member of Training team for DG Nominees (Zones 7(a) and 8(a) at RI Institute in Adelaide in 2002. In 2004, District 9820 Delegate at RI Council on Legislation in Chicago and attended D9830 Latrobe (Tas) Conference as Personal Representative of Rotary International President Jonathan Majiyagbe (RIPPR).

At Mount Martha Rotary, his continued service saw David receive a PHF Sapphire. Then in 2014, then DG Tim Moore visited the Club and presented David with a second PHF Sapphire. David's "Rotary Journey" is extraordinary and demonstrates a level of commitment that few others would ever hope to achieve.



# **Rotary Club of Mount Martha Christmas Raffle**

## WORLD POLIO DAY – ROTARY NEEDS DONATIONS

Dear Rotarians,

During a polio outbreak, children can become ill without warning, leaving parents to worry about how to keep their children safe from a virus spreading throughout their community. They may be hospitalized, develop muscle weakness, or paralysis. But a safe and effective polio vaccine has changed the outlook for billions of children around the world. And while there is no cure for polio, there is a vaccine that can prevent it.

Isaiku Musa Maaji was paralyzed as a child, leaving him with few ways to make a living. Today, he has his own business building hand-operated tricycles to give mobility for



adults and children with physical disabilities. Rotary's Nigeria PolioPlus Committee recently ordered 150 tricycles from Maaji to distribute to polio survivors and others with mobility problems.

The relationship he has built with local Rotarians has motivated him to take part in polio vaccination campaigns.

"It is not easy to be physically challenged. I go out to educate other people on the importance of polio vaccine because I don't want any other person to fall victim to polio."

Working with our partners and with Rotary members just like you, we've reduced the number of polio cases worldwide by 99.9%. But until we end polio forever, every child is at risk. We need your help to eradicate this paralyzing disease.


