How and why I joined Rotary and why I stayed – Merv Williams

In the early 1980s, I was working for Victoria Police and transferred to the Mornington Criminal Investigation Branch. A couple of police officers at the police station were members of the Mount Martha Rotary club and they invited me to join the club.

One of the reasons I joined was that I felt it would be a great opportunity to get involved in the community and met those involved in businesses. I was inducted into the club in November 1984 by Club President Arthur Care.

The club at the time was meeting at the back bar of Kirks Hotel (bar not there anymore) and there were many late-night meetings. One of the memorable events was the clubs red wine bottling day which resulted probably in a financial loss due to the wine tasting and the charcoaled lamb on a spit (someone forgot to keep an eye on it).

Over this time, I have enjoyed helping those in the community whether its hands on projects or fund-raising events.

The Rotary Club has given me many opportunities as the Club President on two occasions, a Director of the club board and working with the District Conference Committee.

In 1997, I was selected as Team Leader representing the District on a Rotary Foundation Group Study Exchange Team to France on a six-week vocational exchange; selected as District Governor in 2015 -16 and been involved with the District Foundation Committee and District Leadership Team.

Over the past few years, I have gathered the passion to serve and provide volunteer work within developing countries on vocational projects. In the Solomon Islands on a dental centre refurbishment & building class-room for the regional training centre. In Sri Lanka on the Helping Hands project fitting prosthetic hands to victims of war injuries or accidents.

I am now involved with Rotary Australia World Community Service in the position of National Manager Projects & Volunteers.

Rotary has changed since 1984 and will continue to change.

I continue to enjoy Rotary and enjoy the connection and camaraderie of the many volunteers who are part of this wonderful organisation called Rotary.



The Club has been fortunate enough to arrange an after-hours visit to the <u>"Victorian"</u> Maritime Museum", thanks to Roger Annear.

When: Monday 3rd May, 6:00 PM.

What's On:

- Please note that this will be an early start at 6:00pm at Crib Point but I hope we can get a good number there to view one of the Mornington Peninsula's hidden secrets.
- We will be given a presentation on the establishment of the Museum and what the future plans are before having time to view an interesting collection of Victorian Maritime history.
- I am planning for us to be at the Museum for about an hour or so.
- Friends and family are welcome to join in.
- Note there is an admission fee of \$5 each which will be collected on the night.

It would be an opportunity to car pool, I have 3 seats spare in my vehicle but will be leaving Mt Martha early at around 5:00pm. It is probably a half hour trip there.
