### Last Monday's Zoom meeting

Professor John Stanley, Dr Mark Fancett and Michelle de la Coeur are founding members of Peninsula Preservation Group and we welcomed them to last week's meeting to speak about the proposed new quarry for the north face of Arthurs Seat

Locals came together to form a company called Peninsula Preservation Group Incorporated to fight this proposal. Their campaign is known as Save Arthurs Seat.

Peninsula Preservation Group have been doing presentations to many groups on the peninsula. They also take individuals and groups on hikes to fully explain the Ross Trust and Hillview Quarries company, the proposed quarry, where the local landcare group have been working and what they've been able to achieve and what could be lost if this proposal goes ahead. The Save Arthurs Seat campaign has been growing with many people and organisations joining the cause. Rob Davies, as our Environmental Leader, lead the Q&A session and thanked the group for their presentation it certainly provided much food for thought and discussion.

### END Trachoma

I was interested to read in a Rotary Newsletter that **The End Trachoma 2020 campaign**, and Rotary involvement, has been extended to end 2022 at least, due to many remaining trachoma hotspots. The Rotary Interactive Facewashing Trailer in operation in communities located west of Katherine NT is the main source of education. The focus remains on "Clean faces and clean hands" which is the key to eliminating trachoma, which still affects 4% of indigenous children in remote communities. This area includes several Trachoma Hotspots (communities with >20% incidence in children).

The modified Interactive Water Trailer in use at Katherine West Health Board (KWHB) is now fully operational and has now visited all communities across their territory. Strengthening of the trailer suspension was completed last Rotary year to cope with rough river crossings and rain affected roads in the territory covered by KWHB which is the size of Victoria.

Several of these hotspots are included in the area covered by KWHB. During school holidays the trailer has been fully used under direction of Jessica Hagley who coordinates health programs.

The trailer has now been able to reach the communities some distance away from Katherine. Larger Communities: They are finding that the interactive water trailer catches the children to attention immediately it arrives with the combination of music and games as the main attraction. This is a project that we may want to consider this year.

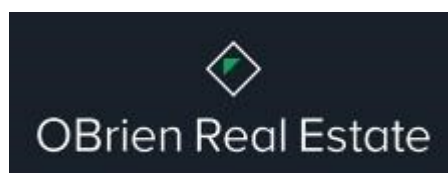

## Rotary Foundation Certificate of Appreciation PROGRESS SIGNS

PROGRESS SIGNS was established in in Mornington in 1988, by Graeme Pollerd and now together with his sons Steve and Craig is a family business that has painted itself into the town's community.

From hand crafted signs to digital plastic wrapped vehicles and boats they are leaders in their field. You need a sign they can produce it.

Always helpful and obliging there are very few organizations from charity, welfare and sporting life that have not been the beneficiary of the generosity of Progress Signs. You only need a glance at the "Wall of Thankyou's" in their workshop to recognise the community organisations they have reached out to and helped. Our Rotary Club has been a beneficiary of their generosity.

Graeme Pollerd himself is a PHF, awarded in 2008.

Today the Rotary Club of Mt Martha awards the business of Progress Signs a Rotary Foundation Certificate of Appreciation in recognition of the contribution that this business has made to the Mornington Community over thirty years. Congratulations to them.

Graeme Pollerd has lived on the peninsula for four decades and prior to Progress had run a few businesses.. "I was at a loose end, in-between jobs and saw an opening. I was working with farm machinery and a local land agent let me know that a sign-writer was needed in the area." At the time, oldest son Steve was working as an apprentice in the sign-writing trade and dad soon convinced him to team up to form a new enterprise. "One of the qualified tradies came with me, I finished my apprenticeship, and we were away," said Steve. A couple of years later, son Craig was looking for a cabinetmaking apprenticeship: "but there was nothing around, till one of dad's crew said 'Well why wouldn't you do your apprenticeship here?'" "Dad said 'Think about it for a week' but I knew I was keen; I finished year 10 and then I joined," Said Craig.

"I wanted a name with some stability about it, and it linked up with Progress Street, where we started off. Later we moved to Yuille Street and then bought a block of land and built our own factory," Graeme adds. "Our first job was a real estate board, all done by brush, but I mainly managed the business. In the early days we had sign-writers around all the factory walls, writing boards and windows, and then computers started to come in," said Graeme. In the early 90s, sign-writing in Melbourne was becoming digital and Progress embraced the technological revolution. It was a big step because we had to invest in a lot of technology," said Craig. "Not many sign-shops around now still offer the full service – we still do hand written signs including 'old looking distressed pieces' for some clients who want an old fashioned look. It's got a lot more character," said Steve. People come in who might be restoring an old horse cart, furniture or a car that needs some pin-lining – we still do that," But many of the peninsula's older hand written signs are disappearing. When the roller-rink in West Rosebud disappeared last year, a slab of Progress' early work went with it. "We've done a lot of antique stuff, which is very rewarding in the end, like the old 30s water carrier that came in bare and went out coloured and pin-lined. In the early days we'd have our ladders and trestles set up in the main street, set out the work and paint it by hand, but nearly all that old work has disappeared now." These days most of the work is created in the factory and erected on-site. The crew also do 'marry me' and birthday banners, some of which are sneakily hung from bridges over peninsula thoroughfares.

Over the years Progress has stuck the name on more than one Skandia-Wild Thing hull, including the Sydney-Hobart winning boat." For one hull I flew to Sydney with all the vinyl and worked on the boat all night under spot lights, to get it done on time," said Steve.

Progress Signs has grown from a small business over the years and is now getting busier and busier with every passing month. The boys have a keen eye for employing exceptional, fully qualified staff, who are looked upon as a second family, not just staff. They are constantly upgrading their skills and receiving new accreditations as the industry changes and grows. With Graeme cutting back his hours to enjoy more of his life and the boys taking over, Progress Signs, has truly become a family business. We know we will stand the test of time and come out ahead as one of the biggest sign writing companies on the Peninsula for many, many years to come.

**Rough night warms the heart**

ROTARIANS sleep in their cars, tents, sheds, or on couches to help the homeless on the Mornington Peninsula for one night last week.

Mount Martha Rotary club president Roger Stacey said transactions were upped by 10% to help support Mount Martha Peninsula's annual Sleep In Your Car event. The experience on Saturday 7 August gave them an insight into what it means to be homeless.

The Rotary community did the event by sleeping in tents and setting a barbecue in Mornington

Park last year, because of coronavirus restrictions, they held a "virtual" sleep-out which raised \$1000. This amount will be added to the \$25,555 Rotary's annual event has already raised.

The cause is urgent: On one given night, 16,421 people are housed in homeless. About 42 per cent are aged under 25.

The Sleep in Your Car event was held in the lead up to Homelessness Week (2-8 August) which is now in its sixth year.

### HOC RESPONSIBILITIES FOR 2023 CONVENTION

The Host Organization Committee (HOC) is a group of Rotarians from the host district(s) who support the success of the convention by fulfilling specific responsibilities. Key responsibilities include:

- Serve as a welcoming committee
- Recruit and manage a volunteer force
- Promote the convention to host districts
- Liaise between key local contacts and RI
- Organise Host Hospitality event
- Identify potential sponsors
- Opportunities for associated tourism & Merchandise Sales

### RECRUITING VOLUNTEERS

Recruitment of volunteers for various roles during the Convention will commence in the next few months. Clubs will be notified about the different roles required from greeting delegates at the airport to ushers and booth crew at the House of Friendship during the Convention. HOC volunteers may be Rotarians, Rotaractors, Interactors, Exchange students and alumni as well as people from community service groups and relatives, or friends of the above.

### HOST HOSPITALITY

Host Hospitality, an RI Convention tradition where delegates are given a memorable evening of hospitality, local culture and international fellowship in the home of a Rotarian, a restaurant or larger venue in the host area is a key responsibility of the HOC. A number of venues and opportunities are currently being considered by the HOC. Over the coming months the HOC will be seeking Host Clubs for the larger events and host families for the home hosting component.

### Next Steps

The International Convention Committee (ICC) chaired by Francesco Arezzo who is a PDG of District 2110 - Sicily & Malta and RI Board Director representing Rotarians in Italy and France, for the period 2018-2020, will hold its first meeting at the end of August. Following that meeting further details regarding volunteers and other Club support will be made available.
